I would like to give you an update on Scott XXXXX This is a 39 engineer with one eye. He lost the vision on the right eye secondary to a retinal detachment. He has also has been operated on the left eye for retinal detachment with scleral buckle. His vision has been NLP on the right eye and 20/400 on the left. With correction the vision the left is 20/25-2

The patient complained of floaters and decreased visual acuity as well as floaters and flashing lights. The patient was seen several times and large floaters were seen. There were two small tears at 5:00 and 6:00 o'clock that was treated with laser.

The patient continued to be greatly disturbed by the floaters and decided to have treatment for those floaters. I have seen him, after the YAG, on 9/2/2005. Vision continues to be 20/25. He is most relieved and his symptomatology has decreased considerable. He is happy with his treatment. His retina has remained attached with a high buckle and no new breaks were seen. He does have a partial vitreous detachment which is still adherent to the macula.

I will continue to follow him along.
